### **Volunteers Serving Schools**



Mentor • Assist • Support

The district volunteer program provides mentors and classroom support for students in Kindergarten through 12th grade.

Youth Mentors provide social, emotional, and academic enrichment for students as well as career or college support for older students. Mentors encourage students to become the best they can be and help prepare them for their future. Mentoring occurs during the school day on school grounds.

Classroom helpers support teachers but can also help in many other ways. They can assist with art, music, library support, small group reading or math, before or after school homework sessions, history or debate judging, field day help, bulletin board displays and special projects.

Watch D.O.G.S.

### **Olathe Transition Supports Program**



The Olathe Transition Supports Program provides opportunities for students to acquire skills to promote a successful transition to the community after high school. Community businesses partner with transition programs within the district to provide real-world vocational training opportunities for students 16 years old and older with disabilities. Students complete various tasks at the community based work site with job coach supervision as needed. Transportation is provided by the school district.

Community partners can also provide Work-Based Learning Experiences that provide students with real-world workplace preparation. Career Pathways include students that are part of the 21st Century Academics, Career and Technical Education Pathways and/or Olathe Advanced Technical Center programs.
