He knows a box of 12 sparklers costs \$2.00.

They are expecting 500 people to attend the celebration. How much will the city spend if they want each person to get a sparkler?

Math: There are 82 fifth graders going on a field trip. The bus holds 53 students, how many buses will they need to take for their field trip?



Writing: Write a realistic fiction story about a fourth-grade student from 20 years ago. What was their daily life like? How was it similar to yours? How was it different?

Math: Ms. Wonka baked three trays of 36 cookies each. After they cooled, she divided the cookies evenly into 27 bags. How many cookies did she place in each bag?

**Reading:** Set a timer for 20 minutes and read your favorite book.



Math: An ice cream shop sells cones for \$2.00 each. This weekend the shop sold 250 cones on Saturday. Sunday sales were half of Saturday sales. If their goal was to make \$1,000 in ice cream sales this weekend, did they meet their goal? Why or why not?

Writing: Write about some things you can do during the summertime but cannot enjoy during the school year.

## Answers to Math:

- Nick and Angela left at 9:00 pm to go to the show.
- They need six vans for 64 students so the total cost for vans will be \$750.
- Johnny spent a total of \$4.20 on his items, so he has \$6.30 left from the \$10.50 he started with.
- The area to be fenced has a total perimeter of 1,000 yards. Since there are three feet per yard, the total number of feet of fencing needed will be 3,000.
- Since there are 14 days in 2 weeks, the students will need to read 9 pages per night.
- The total number of people going, including Sanika and her parents is 11. It will cost \$22.00 for the show, plus a parking cost of \$22.00 for the two cars driven. So the total cost will be \$44.00. They should receive \$6.00 in change from their \$50 bill.
- Since there are 12 sparklers per box, for 500 people you would need 42 boxes of sparklers.
   The total cost would then be \$84.00.
- They will need two buses to carry all the fifth graders.
- Ms. Wonka baked a total of 108 cookies. She placed 4 cookies in each bag.
- The ice cream shop made \$500 on Saturday and \$250 on Sunday. The total sales were \$750 for the weekend, so they did not reach their goal of \$1,000.



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
